From creating your team to administering quality assessments to accurately interpreting findings and communicating with parents and families, it is critical to have the knowledge and skills to best support students with ASD.

Participants will be introduced to important research, key concepts, and strategies around:

- Understanding the legal and ethical foundations of evaluation in public schools, recognizing autism in girls, and identifying catatonia in students with ASD
- Forming and supporting the trans-disciplinary evaluations teams
- Developing a comprehensive evaluation team report and providing parent and staff feedback
- Understanding the importance of adaptive behavior and emotional functioning in the assessment for educational identification of ASD, as well as learning about various assessment tools

**Educational Identification
and the Law; Autism in
Girls; Catatonia**

The focus of this training is the legal and ethical foundations of evaluation in the public schools. Federal and state guidelines for evaluation will be presented along with examples from case law. Autism as defined in Ohio's Operating Standards, IDEA, and the DSM will be reviewed. Those making decisions regarding eligibility for Special Education must be familiar with the two tiers of eligibility – disability and adverse effect on educational performance. These tiers will be discussed and applied. The impact of factors such as gender, race, and socio-economic status will also be reviewed. In addition, as many as 18% of individuals with ASD also have symptoms of catatonia. The importance of considering catatonia during the course of an assessment for educational identification of autism will be emphasized.

**Trans-Disciplinary
Evaluation Teams**

Trans-disciplinary autism evaluation teams with well-trained and experienced team members must be established before any district, region, or state can adequately serve students with ASD. In almost all circumstances, this will require significant systems change. They must work together in a collaborative fashion throughout the steps of the evaluation process – preparation, administration, interpretation, and communication of results. The formation and functioning of the trans-disciplinary autism evaluation team will be the focus of this training. Emphasis will be placed on the team decision-making process as applied to case studies. Topics will include low-threshold behaviors and how to interpret discrepancies in observations.

**Developing a
Comprehensive
Evaluation Team
Report and Providing
Parent and Staff
Feedback**

The evaluation team produces a report summarizing findings and culminating in recommendations. Elements of a strong report will be discussed. Quality, individualized recommendations for programming and intervention are the most important part of the team report. A comparison of recommendations made by members from different fields working in isolation to recommendations formulated through collaboration by a trans-disciplinary team will be presented.

February 3

Assessment Tools

A well-trained and experienced team is the most important element of a quality assessment. A specific test is a tool that is only as effective as the team members who utilize it. An introduction of a variety of useful tools will be presented. A recent study found that adaptive behavior was the single best predictor of employment, social engagement, and quality of life in adulthood. The importance of including assessment of adaptive behavior in an assessment for educational identification of autism will be discussed. Assessment tools may include:

- Adaptive Behavior Assessment System, Third Edition (ABAS-3)
- Autism Diagnostic Observation Schedule (ADOS-2)
- Autism Spectrum Rating Scales (ASRS)
- Childhood Autism Rating Scales (CARS 2)
- Children's Communication Checklist-2 (CCC-2)
- Gilliam Autism Rating Scale (GARS-3)
- Monteiro Interview Guidelines for Diagnosing Apserger's Syndrome (MIGDAS)
- Psychoeducational Profile: Third Edition (PEP-3)
- Sensory Processing Measure™(SPM™)
- Sensory Profile
- Social Responsiveness Scale (SRS-2)
- Underlying Characteristics Checklist (UCC-EI, UCC-CL, UCC-HF, UCC-SR_Adolescent, UCC-SR-Adult)
